Kindergarten Lesson Guide

Stepping Stones

These are the main language lessons. Many relate to other subject matter. Do these in order, but mix in the Story Time lessons. Some Stepping Stones contain cultural segments. Occasional gaps in the numbering are intentional. Average length is 10 minutes.

La Senda de las Apalaches. Part 2 of 2. Meet the carpenter bee. Miscellaneous vocabulary. Prueba on the AT.

Drawing Gatos. Draw cats and practice body parts. Emphasis on "otro" (other, another). Kids draw along with me.

Lesson 34

Zum-Zum. So many ways to say some things. This lesson brings together geography, culture, language and backyard wildlife, namely hummingbirds.

Lesson 34a

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A Pack of Pals. Part 5 of 5. Ms. Hack continues showing how to work with alpaca fleece, using hand combs, a spinning wheel and looms. Then we put South America into perspective from several angles on a globe to show students where the alpacas come from.

The Million-Dollar Casa. Part 3 of 3. Well, what do you think? Is the house worth a million dollars? The second half of this video tells a little story outdoors to practices colors, "Where are you?", and pronunciation of colors.

The Bear Went Over the Mountain. Part 1 of 2. The words "bear" and "ver" make a very interesting comparison between languages. We will learn the song over the months.

Bilingual Story Time No. 5

The Bear Went Over the Mountain. Part 2 of 2. Continue learning the song. Anyone can draw an oso.

Bilingual Story Time No. 6

Wild Pink Piggy and Bears. Part 1 of 2. Start learning some foods. Manzana, queso, naranja, tomate, pollo. Draw bears. Oso, ojo. (When I listen to this video and the next one, I wonder why in the world I'm pronouncing Spanish with an English accent! It's because my mind was operating in English. All of us who speak and think in more than one language fluently do this, at least until we realize what we're doing.)

Bilingual Story Time No. 19

El Dólar. Part 1 of 2. Janelle finds a dollar but can't spend it, because nobody will take it. The dollar doesn't seem to like what she wants to do with it. Friendship theme. Miscellaneous vocabulary.

Bilingual Story Time No. 20

El Dólar. Part 2 of 2. Janelle is still having a hard time spending the dollar she found. Finally, someone accepts it. Friendship theme.

Bilingual Story Time No. 21

Muchas camisas. A boy in class says he's warm and he's going to do something about it. Tengo calor./I'm hot. No lo hagas./Don't do it.

Bilingual Story Time No. 22

Los Tres Cerditos. Part 1 of 3. The Three Little Pigs. Look out for the scary pink wolf.

Bilingual Story Time No. 23

Los Tres Cerditos. Part 2 of 3. The Three Little Pigs. Los cerditos start running into trouble with the big, bad, pink wolf. The lyrics of the song are: ¿Quién teme al lobo feroz, al lobo, al lobo? Or, ¿Quién teme al lobo feroz, lobo feroz, lobo feroz?

You'll notice occasional gaps in the numbering. This is intentional. Average length is 10 minutes.

Handout for León Y Nada Más - This kind of handout is not for using during lessons, because it distracts from content and techniques on the screen.

Lesson 21

León Y Nada Más. Adds the third verse of the song, continuing our work on pronunciation, as all our songs do. A tricky, optional quiz for 2nd grade and up.

Lesson 22

Hay Algo en el Agua. Part 1 of 2. This two-part bilingual story incorporates several vocabulary and grammatical categories that we've worked with so far, along with some new content and the visual arts concept of perspective. The concept is intentionally left unexplained. Second-graders' brains go into overdrive in this lesson, trying to figure out the illusion or what they may think is no illusion, and third-graders offer confident explanations that are almost never right.

A piano tuner comes to tune the spinet piano used in some lessons. He walks us through the innards of the piano and explains the tuning process. He closes with a South American song. Verbs: tocar, escuchar, affirmative and negative.

Upper El Lessons 14-19, 23 - Responding to commands, and interpreting single sentences. Pretty rigorous. Many, many items. Suggestion: Don't use the handouts with a lesson until you've done the lesson at least once.

Commands 2. Respond physically. Contains 40 to 50 items. If you pause as needed, this lesson will probably stretch out to two or three sessions.

Rooms and ¿Quién Soy? Spell and draw the rooms of a house. Arriba, abajo (upstairs, downstairs). Accenting the third-to-the-last syllable (recámara). Identify family members by how tall they are: "Soy de 6 pies" (I'm five-eight).

Upper El Lesson 26

Drawing Family. When they aren't looking, you can draw your family any way you want. You can draw anything to practice Spanish vocabulary.

Upper El Lesson 27

Scrambled Palabras. Unscramble 25 English words to make Spanish words out of them. Then give their meanings. This lesson is actually three lessons at least. Pause the lesson as instructed and stretch it over several sessions. Use paper and pencil. Length is probably equal to three lessons because of the pausing.

Stepping Stones

This version of Stepping Stones has a faster pace, more detail, and higher level of challenge than the ones for K to grade 3. Older students also have more lessons. Stepping Stones are the main language instruction. Do them in order. You might try doing two Stepping Stones, then a Cultural Insight and an Upper El 60. You'll find those lessons below. You'll notice occasional gaps in the numbering. This is intentional. Average length is 10 minutes.

Lesson 1

Prima Abbie. Meet una futbolista. Sing Itsy Bitsy Spider in Spanish. Practice five colors and then take a quiz. No paper needed for this one.

Handout for Arañititita - Here are the words for the song, Arañititita. The song first appears in Lesson 1 and then is reinforced in succeeding lessons here and there.

Arañititita - Use our Spanish version of Itsy Bitsy Spider with the handout.

Lesson 2

The Spanish Alphabet. Part 1 of 2. The Spanish alphabet. Take a quiz.

Lesson 2a

The Spanish Alphabet. Part 2 of 2. The Spanish alphabet. Take a quiz.

Lesson 2b

A Little Review of Lessons 1, 2 and 2a. Pronounce the letter 'd.' The respectful titles, don and doña. Review alphabet and colors, and then take a quiz.

Some Numbers. Camote monster. Practice numbers and pronouncing them. Take a 5-item Práctica that requires close listening and quick writing of letters and numbers.

Lesson 4

Colors Handout. Practice lots of colors. Meet some family members. Take a Prueba on scoops of color and on letters and numbers. Listen fast!

Lesson 5

Nervous Uno. Meet a cicada. Try telling this children's story. Double question and exclamation marks. You smell really good. Flores bonitas/pretty flowers.

Lesson 6

Animales and 11-20. Introduces numbers 11-20 briefly. Colors, family. An optional variety quiz.

Lesson 7

Animal Sounds and -ito. Dial phone numbers. Animal sounds. Using -ito to indicate little, little bitty, and endearment.

Lesson 8

Papás y Sol. Double digits. El pato es rojo y moreno. No tengo gato. Sing while drawing. Ma and pa in various languages.

Lesson 8a

This activity uses the handout with color cutouts, but you don't have to use them to make this activity worth its time.

Lesson 9

Talking Is Like Singing. Tones make a big difference in meaning in any language. Compare Spanish, English and Mandarin in numbers one to ten.

Lesson 9a

A Escribir Palabras. Write words and fill in blanks. Could take two sessions to complete.

Lesson 9b

Palabras Revueltas. Unscramble palabras. This might take two sessions to complete.

Lesson 10

Tortilla and the Teacher. Part 1 of 2. This session is a way to teach some culture, review and extend some language information, and tell about myself.

Lesson 11

Tortilla and the Teacher. Part 2 of 2. The tortilla represents a history of hard work behind every meal. This can help us appreciate the meals that seem to come so easily to us.

Lesson 11a

Saludos (Greetings). Different forms of 'you' in Spanish. Take a Prueba and guess which food is talking. Practice greetings.

Lesson 12

At the Park. Part 1 of 2. Making los peluches (stuffed animals) talk is a good way to practice Spanish. Older kids can skip this lesson, or they can learn from it. The animals tell their names and give short descriptions of themselves.

Lesson 13

At the Park. Part 2 of 2. Los peluches greet in Spanish. Practice colors in a song. Do a tangle tongue. Older kids can skip this lesson -- or learn from it.

Lesson 14

El Pastel. There's plenty of cake to go around for everyone who makes it to the table. Please excuse a fit by Yésica. Me gusta/No me gusta.

This Simon Says lesson uses a complex set of techniques that help kids learn body parts and listen well. Repeat a few times if the kids are willing. Something extra about a moco.

Pronunciation Guide - Geared for intermediate grades and adults. Can be used to guide early grades.

Lesson 16

Tengo +. I'm cold, sleepy, thirsty, scared, hot, hungry. Hermanos y tíos (brother and sister, aunt and uncle).

Lesson 17

Patito, Patito. Learn the ducky song. Do re mi is a little different in Spanish. Take a Prueba: He's my brother. He's your brother?

Lesson 18

Me Duele. We all need to be able to say where we're hurting and to understand when others tell us where they're hurting -- especially when you're a world traveler.

Lesson 19

Cue Qui. Take a Prueba on Me duele/duelen. My head and my feet hurt.

Lesson 19a

Putting People in Places. Home, factory, library, etc. Finish la Prueba on Me Duele.

Handout aa - Optional. Two sets of vocabulary: animals and family.

Handout bb - Two places—house/home and school.

Lesson 19b

Animals and People in Places. Use the process of elimination to tell where people are.

Lesson 19c

Putting People and Animals in Places. Verdad o Falso: Tengo un perro blanco y dos peces rojos. No están en la escuela.

Lesson 19d

Palabras Revueltas. Unscrambling these six items might take more than one session. Be ready to hit the pause button often.

Lesson 20

Provides some encouragement about typical fear in the night, and begins to teach a song called León Y Nada Más. The song cultivates good pronunciation. Ends with something about noodles.

Handout for León Y Nada Más - This kind of handout is not for using during lessons, because it distracts from content and techniques on the screen.

Lesson 21

León Y Nada Más. Adds the third verse of the song, continuing our work on pronunciation, as all our songs do. A tricky, optional quiz for 2nd grade and up.

Handout for numbers 1-15 - Numbers 1-15 and some miscellany. Use as you please.

Lesson 22

Hay Algo en el Agua. Part 1 of 2. This two-part bilingual story incorporates several vocabulary and grammatical categories that we've worked with so far, along with some new content and the visual arts concept of perspective. The concept is intentionally left unexplained. Second-graders' brains go into overdrive in this lesson, trying to figure out the illusion or what they may think is no illusion, and third-graders offer confident explanations that are almost never right.

Handout for Hay Algo en el Agua - For Lessons 22 and 23. Not for using during the lessons.

Lesson 23

Hay Algo en el Agua. Part 2 of 2. Would you let your pets drink the water?

Handout aa1 - Mi familia. Use as you please.

Handout dd - Tengo hambre, etc. (I'm hungry, etc.) Use as you please.

Lesson 24

A piano tuner comes to tune the spinet piano used in some lessons. He walks us through the innards of the piano and explains the tuning process. He closes with a South American song. Verbs: tocar, escuchar, affirmative and negative.

Lesson 25

Singing about animals—all three verses of León Y Nada Más and introducing the first three verses of Tenía Vaca Un Señor.

Handout for Tenía Vaca un Señor - (Not for using during the lessons.) Nothing beats singing when it comes to developing great pronunciation. We'll do a lot of it! Note that the letter "r" in rana (frog) can be spelled "ere" or "erre" and can be pronounced with a single or a longer trill.

Lesson 31

La Senda de las Apalaches. Part 1 of 2. Meet one kind of carpenter bird on the Appalachian Trail. Miscellaneous vocabulary. Prueba on the AT.

La Senda de las Apalaches. Part 2 of 2. Meet the carpenter bee. Miscellaneous vocabulary. Prueba on the AT.

Lesson 33

Drawing Gatos. Draw cats and practice body parts. Emphasis on "otro" (other, another). Kids draw along with me.

Lesson 34

Zum-Zum. So many ways to say some things. This lesson brings together geography, culture, language and backyard wildlife, namely hummingbirds.

Lesson 34a

Perro Guardián. Part 1 of 2. A very nice, pink, ferocious doggy protects his owner's property from the rude birds and butterflies.

Lesson 34b

Perro Guardián. Part 2 of 2. The pink, ferocious doggy dreams a dream. One day he WILL go out and chase away the rude critters outside the patio door.

Lesson 35

Otro Platillo, Por Favor. Part 1 of 3. The nice Spanish teacher ate a LOT of cereal before going to South America. This story targets overeating, rather than obesity, because a much greater number of people overeat, including us who are somewhat thin. Overeating can cause fatigue and make us less productive and less alert.

Lesson 36

Otro Platillo, Por Favor. Part 2 of 3. He ate and ate and ate some more. Oh, how he loved his cereal.

Otro Platillo, Por Favor. Part 3 of 3. Spoon, fork, knife, napkin, etc. Quiero/Te quiero. Family photo.

Handout ii - Optional. Manipulatives for tableware. For Lesson 37 and the kids' own use.

Lesson 38

Consentidos. Come on, now, is your hermanito or hermanita truly a rotten papa? Prueba on "spoiled."

Lesson 45

¡Qué Palabras! Words of one language can look just like words of another language. But they usually don't sound alike or mean the same thing. Review buenos días, buenas tardes, buenas noches. El gallo that woke up too soon. Spoiled brats.

Alpacas are from South America and have become a fascinating part of culture in the U.S. This series is a visit to White Violet Center at St. Mary of the Woods, IN, a ministry of the Sisters of Providence. Year round, the Center offers workshops, internships and field trips to their alpacas, organic garden, woods and wetlands. You don't have to be Catholic to appreciate how the Sisters teach about caring for the earth while tying into education standards. Your students will love this series.

Saludos (Greetings). Different forms of 'you' in Spanish. Take a Prueba and guess which food is talking. Practice greetings.

Lesson 12

At the Park. Part 1 of 2. Making los peluches (stuffed animals) talk is a good way to practice Spanish. Older kids can skip this lesson, or they can learn from it. The animals tell their names and give short descriptions of themselves.

Lesson 13

Tengo +. I'm cold, sleepy, thirsty, scared, hot, hungry. Hermanos y tíos (brother and sister, aunt and uncle).

Patito, Patito. Learn the ducky song. Do re mi is a little different in Spanish. Take a Prueba: He's my brother. He's your brother?

Drawing Family. When they aren't looking, you can draw your family any way you want. You can draw anything to practice Spanish vocabulary.

Upper El Lesson 27

Scrambled Palabras. Unscramble 25 English words to make Spanish words out of them. Then give their meanings. This lesson is actually three lessons at least. Pause the lesson as instructed and stretch it over several sessions. Use paper and pencil. Length is probably equal to three lessons because of the pausing.

Verb Tenses. Work with tenses and which pronouns go with the different verb endings. 1st, 2nd and 3rd person singular and plural. Take a 10-item Práctica.

Upper El Lesson 32

Verb Tenses. Continue working with verb tenses and endings. Ten-item Práctica.

Continued: -ar and -ir Verbs. More Spanish verbs end in -ar than in -er and -ir. Interpret a conversation with -ir.

Big Money, Saber and Conocer, Occupations. Ten-point Práctica: I know a policewoman who sings well.

Stepping Stones

This version of Stepping Stones has a faster pace, more detail, and higher level of challenge than the ones for lower elementary. Older students also have more lessons. Stepping Stones are the main language instruction. Do them in order. You might try doing two Stepping Stones, then a Cultural Insight and an Upper El 60. You'll find those lessons below. You'll notice occasional gaps in the numbering. This is intentional. Average length is 10 minutes.

Lesson 1

Prima Abbie. Meet una futbolista. Sing Itsy Bitsy Spider in Spanish. Practice five colors and then take a quiz. No paper needed for this one.

Handout for Arañititita - Here are the words for the song, Arañititita. The song first appears in Lesson 1 and then is reinforced in succeeding lessons here and there.

Lesson 2

The Spanish Alphabet. Part 1 of 2. The Spanish alphabet. Take a guiz.

Lesson 2a

The Spanish Alphabet. Part 2 of 2. The Spanish alphabet. Take a quiz.

Lesson 2b

A Little Review of Lessons 1, 2 and 2a. Pronounce the letter 'd.' The respectful titles, don and doña. Review alphabet and colors, and then take a quiz.

Some Numbers. Camote monster. Practice numbers and pronouncing them. Take a 5-item Práctica that requires close listening and quick writing of letters and numbers.

Lesson 4

Colors Handout. Practice lots of colors. Meet some family members. Take a Prueba on scoops of color and on letters and numbers. Listen fast!

Lesson 5

Nervous Uno. Meet a cicada. Try telling this children's story. Double question and exclamation marks. You smell really good. Flores bonitas/pretty flowers.

Lesson 6

Animales and 11-20. Introduces numbers 11-20 briefly. Colors, family. An optional variety quiz.

Lesson 7

Animal Sounds and -ito. Dial phone numbers. Animal sounds. Using -ito to indicate little, little bitty, and endearment.

Lesson 8

Papás y Sol. Double digits. El pato es rojo y moreno. No tengo gato. Sing while drawing. Ma and pa in various languages.

Lesson 8a

This activity uses the handout with color cutouts, but you don't have to use them to make this activity worth its time.

Lesson 9

Talking Is Like Singing. Tones make a big difference in meaning in any language. Compare Spanish, English and Mandarin in numbers one to ten.

Lesson 9a

A Escribir Palabras. Write words and fill in blanks. Could take two sessions to complete.

Lesson 9b

Palabras Revueltas. Unscramble palabras. This might take two sessions to complete.

Lesson 10

Tortilla and the Teacher. Part 1 of 2. This session is a way to teach some culture, review and extend some language information, and tell about myself.

Lesson 11

Tortilla and the Teacher. Part 2 of 2. The tortilla represents a history of hard work behind every meal. This can help us appreciate the meals that seem to come so easily to us.

Lesson 11a

Saludos (Greetings). Different forms of 'you' in Spanish. Take a Prueba and guess which food is talking. Practice greetings.

Lesson 12

At the Park. Part 1 of 2. Making los peluches (stuffed animals) talk is a good way to practice Spanish. Older kids can skip this lesson, or they can learn from it. The animals tell their names and give short descriptions of themselves.

Lesson 13

At the Park. Part 2 of 2. Los peluches greet in Spanish. Practice colors in a song. Do a tangle tongue. Older kids can skip this lesson -- or learn from it.

Lesson 14

El Pastel. There's plenty of cake to go around for everyone who makes it to the table. Please excuse a fit by Yésica. Me gusta/No me gusta.

This Simon Says lesson uses a complex set of techniques that help kids learn body parts and listen well. Repeat a few times if the kids are willing. Something extra about a moco.

Pronunciation Guide - Geared for intermediate grades and adults. Can be used to guide early grades.

Lesson 16

Tengo +. I'm cold, sleepy, thirsty, scared, hot, hungry. Hermanos y tíos (brother and sister, aunt and uncle).

Lesson 17

Patito, Patito. Learn the ducky song. Do re mi is a little different in Spanish. Take a Prueba: He's my brother. He's your brother?

Lesson 18

Me Duele. We all need to be able to say where we're hurting and to understand when others tell us where they're hurting -- especially when you're a world traveler.

Lesson 19

Cue Qui. Take a Prueba on Me duele/duelen. My head and my feet hurt.

Lesson 19a

Putting People in Places. Home, factory, library, etc. Finish la Prueba on Me Duele.

Handout aa - Optional. Two sets of vocabulary: animals and family.

Handout bb - Two places—house/home and school.

Lesson 19b

Animals and People in Places. Use the process of elimination to tell where people are.

Lesson 19c

Putting People and Animals in Places. Verdad o Falso: Tengo un perro blanco y dos peces rojos. No están en la escuela.

Lesson 19d

Palabras Revueltas. Unscrambling these six items might take more than one session. Be ready to hit the pause button often.

Lesson 20

Provides some encouragement about typical fear in the night, and begins to teach a song called León Y Nada Más. The song cultivates good pronunciation. Ends with something about noodles.

Handout for León Y Nada Más - This kind of handout is not for using during lessons, because it distracts from content and techniques on the screen.

Lesson 21

León Y Nada Más. Adds the third verse of the song, continuing our work on pronunciation, as all our songs do. A tricky, optional quiz for 2nd grade and up.

Handout for numbers 1-15 - Numbers 1-15 and some miscellany. Use as you please.

Lesson 22

Hay Algo en el Agua. Part 1 of 2. This two-part bilingual story incorporates several vocabulary and grammatical categories that we've worked with so far, along with some new content and the visual arts concept of perspective. The concept is intentionally left unexplained. Second-graders' brains go into overdrive in this lesson, trying to figure out the illusion or what they may think is no illusion, and third-graders offer confident explanations that are almost never right.

Handout for Hay Algo en el Agua - For Lessons 22 and 23. Not for using during the lessons.

Lesson 23

Hay Algo en el Agua. Part 2 of 2. Would you let your pets drink the water?

Handout aa1 - Mi familia. Use as you please.

Handout dd - Tengo hambre, etc. (I'm hungry, etc.) Use as you please.

Lesson 24

A piano tuner comes to tune the spinet piano used in some lessons. He walks us through the innards of the piano and explains the tuning process. He closes with a South American song. Verbs: tocar, escuchar, affirmative and negative.

Lesson 25

Singing about animals—all three verses of León Y Nada Más and introducing the first three verses of Tenía Vaca Un Señor.

Handout for Tenía Vaca un Señor - (Not for using during the lessons.) Nothing beats singing when it comes to developing great pronunciation. We'll do a lot of it! Note that the letter "r" in rana (frog) can be spelled "ere" or "erre" and can be pronounced with a single or a longer trill.

La Senda de las Apalaches. Part 1 of 2. Meet one kind of carpenter bird on the Appalachian Trail. Miscellaneous vocabulary. Prueba on the AT.

La Senda de las Apalaches. Part 2 of 2. Meet the carpenter bee. Miscellaneous vocabulary. Prueba on the AT.

Lesson 33

Drawing Gatos. Draw cats and practice body parts. Emphasis on "otro" (other, another). Kids draw along with me.

Lesson 34

Zum-Zum. So many ways to say some things. This lesson brings together geography, culture, language and backyard wildlife, namely hummingbirds.

Lesson 34a

Perro Guardián. Part 1 of 2. A very nice, pink, ferocious doggy protects his owner's property from the rude birds and butterflies.

Lesson 34b

Perro Guardián. Part 2 of 2. The pink, ferocious doggy dreams a dream. One day he WILL go out and chase away the rude critters outside the patio door.

Lesson 35

Highlands. Part 6 of 10. Somebody's doing laundry in the mountain stream. Such colorful clothing! Someone else is shooting a bow and arrow. We visit another home where colorful yarn is hanging out to dry.

Highlands. Part 7 of 10. Agrepina is making a scarf on her loom. David sings a song in Spanish. The family offers us chuño, choclo and queso.

Highlands. Part 8 of 10. Fredy explains the potatoes while we continue sampling the family's food. We take another long coast down the mountain road.

Highlands. Part 9 of 10. It's possible to get confused about the names of towns. Ollantaytambo is hard to pronounce at first! Don't bump your head on the low doorways! We leave the highlands. Next lesson takes us to another highland.

Upper El Lesson 26

Drawing Family. When they aren't looking, you can draw your family any way you want. You can draw anything to practice Spanish vocabulary.

Upper El Lesson 27

Scrambled Palabras. Unscramble 25 English words to make Spanish words out of them. Then give their meanings. This lesson is actually three lessons at least. Pause the lesson as instructed and

stretch it over several sessions. Use paper and pencil. Length is probably equal to three lessons because of the pausing.

Verb Tenses. Work with tenses and which pronouns go with the different verb endings. 1st, 2nd and 3rd person singular and plural. Take a 10-item Práctica.
